### **New Pilot Mentor Program to start in April!!**

We are piloting a Student Mentoring program this spring. We believe that every child could use an additional mentor in their life. The role of our mentors is to listen, encourage and support students. During this pandemic, many people (children and adults) have encountered stress and challenges. We will start our pilot with only three or four mentors. Each mentor will commit one hour each week for the remainder of the year to work with one student. This would only take place if both the parents and the student would like to be involved in this voluntary mentor program. We will be providing more information at conferences if you are interested in signing up. The program will last from April until the end of the school year. *All mentors have had their state background checks completed and are employed by Index School District. ### **Fun Facts & Symbols for St. Patrick's Day**

Green is part of St Patrick's Day because it's the color of Spring and many people wear green on St Pat's Day

One of the Irish traditions is to pinch anyone who is not wearing green on St Patrick's Day.

The most common St Patrick's Day symbol is the shamrock. The shamrock is a leaf from the clover plant.

It's a myth that the shamrock can only grow in Ireland – the three-leaf clover grows all over the world – from Tasmania to England.

Symbols like the pot-of-gold at the end of a rainbow and leprechauns are also associated with St. Patrick's Day.

The leprechaun is a small Irish fairy who dresses like a shoemaker. Leprechauns are unfriendly little men who live alone in the forest, spending time making shoes and guarding their gold treasures. If you catch a leprechaun, he'll be forced to tell you where he hides his pots of gold. However the leprechaun must be watched at all times. If his captor looks away, the leprechaun will vanish along with his treasure.



## How to Build a Leprechaun Trap

If you want to catch a leprechaun, you should try to build a trap.

A leprechaun is an Irish "elf." They are small in size, and some say they look like tiny old men in top hats with red beards. They are tricky fellows and like to play pranks on unsuspecting people.

Legend says that leprechauns are shoemakers (also called cobblers). Curiously enough, they supposedly only make one of each type of shoe. It is said that you can tell a leprechaun is near if you hear the tapping of their hammers.

Each leprechaun also has a pot of gold. Some say they bury it in secret places only they can reach; others say they hide it at the end of the rainbow. One thing is for sure, though, if you catch a leprechaun he will lead you to his pot of gold and give it to you as a bribe to let him go.

Remember, leprechauns are tricky fellows so you must be creative and tricky when deciding on a way to try to catch him. You can try to lure him to you and grab him, or you can try to build a trap to capture him in. If you are lucky enough to capture one, your work is not done yet. Legend says you cannot take your eyes off him for even a second or he will disappear.

## Build a Trap

The first thing you need to do is build a trap. There is no right or wrong way to build a leprechaun trap.

You can make a contraption with a net, boxes, a clean can, or anything else you can think of such as paper towel rolls, empty containers, tin foil, paper, string or yarn, sandwich bags, etc; or, how about using an old shoe since they are said to be cobblers? You have to be very creative to catch a leprechaun!

## Add Bait

Once you build your trap, don't forget to add bait to help lure in the leprechaun. Since they are very greedy, one of the best things you can use for bait is coins. If you don't want to use real coins, you can easily substitute candy coins or make your own gold coins by cutting circles out of cardboard and painting them gold. Gold nuggets made by painting small rocks are another option.

Here are a few more tips and suggestions to help you get started:

- [Rainbows](#) are good to use on or around your trap.
- Color your trap green and decorate it with green items (stickers, glitter, etc.).
- Leprechauns are also attracted to four-leaf clovers.
- They tend to like Lucky Charms cereal.
- Make sure your trap is disguised well—make sure it blends into its surroundings.
- No two traps should be alike or the leprechaun will get suspicious and leave.
- A leprechaun may leave a trail of gold and/or green glitter, so watch for it.

Now you should be ready to build your trap. There's no guarantee you will catch one of these little creatures, but hopefully, you have fun in the attempt!

## Schedule

### General Questions:

#### **How do I join an event held on Zoom?**

With the move to providing programs online, you'll find that many of the events are held using a third-party platform called Zoom. Zoom is great for small groups with lots of interaction, as well as large events with hundreds of people in attendance.

There are some things to know that will help you have a fun and safe experience attending any of our Zoom events.

#### **\*\*Registration Required**

For the safety and enjoyment of all, we ask program attendees to register in advance. Shortly before the event, library staff will send you an email with the link that provides access to the program, along with any other information you need to know.

#### **What should I expect when I join a Zoom event?**

Library staff will send you an email ahead of the scheduled program. If you do not receive the email by 3:00 pm as expected, check your spam folder or the "Promotions" tab if you're using Gmail. If you are unable to find the email, please contact us for assistance.

When you click the link in the email you've been sent, Zoom will open into a waiting room and a host will let you in shortly. Depending on the program, you'll be able to turn on your audio and video to participate in the program. You may be allowed to chat with all participants, or just the hosts. In larger events both video and audio may be disabled for all attendees. Library staff select the appropriate settings for the

type of program to ensure a safe, secure, and enjoyable event.

#### **How to Register**

(In your address bar) type Sultan Library Events. When the results pop up, choose Events / Sno-Isle Libraries. Once in the Events Page, on the left side of the page you can request specific dates/months, Event Types, Programs, and what audience you want this directed towards.

(Example for "Reading with Rover shown below), input March's dates, with "Family" and "Kids" chosen under Audiences. Once in, click on the blue, double arrows shown at the end of the title "Reading with Rover". When the new page appears, on the upper right side of the screen will be 2 boxes...one that says REGISTRATION REQUIRED and one below that reads CONTACT INFO where an email is provided to request that particular event.
